ORDER regarding Plaintiffs' Unopposed Request to Correct the Record *Nunc Pro Tunc*. (Doc. 545). Plaintiffs indicate the Unopposed Motion and Incorporated Memorandum of Law for Final Approval of Settlement (Doc. 544) seeks the final approval of, inter alia the proposed Plan of Allocation. That Plan of Allocation contains a scrivener's error in that "Paragraph 8 defines the 'Phase 1 Distribution Date' as 30 days 'after the Settlement becomes Final, as that term is defined in the parties' Settlement Agreement," when "Paragraph 8 should define the 'Phase 1 Distribution Date' as 30 days 'after the final deposit of the settlement funds in the Settlement Fund Account pursuant to Section 6.7 of the Settlement Agreement.' "In order to make the Plan of Allocation consistent with the Settlement Agreement, Plaintiffs request that the Court correct the record nunc pro tunc. Defendants do not oppose that request. Accordingly, the Unopposed Request is GRANTED. See Justice v. Town of Cicero, Illinois, 682 F.3d 662, 664 (7th Cir. 2012) ("Nunc pro tunc, a Latin phrase, means 'now for then.' A judge has the power to change records so that they show what actually happened."); Transamerica Ins. Co. v. South, 975 F.2d 321, 325-26 (7th Cir. 1992) ("As a general rule, district courts may issue nunc pro tunc orders 'to show what was actually done but not properly or adequately recorded.' [Citations]. Thus, a nunc pro tunc order is typically used to correct clerical or ministerial errors or a failure of the court to reduce to judgment what it stated orally or in an opinion. [Citations]....

[H]owever, the district court may not make substantive changes affecting parties' rights *nunc pro tunc*.... 'The office of a *nunc pro tunc* ("now for then") order is to clean up the records by showing what was previously done with effect from the time done; it is not to alter substantive rights....' 'The Latin phrase is merely descriptive of the inherent power of the court to make its records speak the truthto record that which was actually done, but omitted to be recorded. It is no warrant for the entry of an order to record that which was omitted to be done.' "). Consistent with the parties' settlement agreement, the Phase 1 Distribution Date is 30 days after the final deposit of the settlement funds in the Settlement Fund Account pursuant to Section 6.7 of the Settlement Agreement.
